Kennon Pye Sails away, 22 June 2006

As a founding member of SPSC, Ken and the club are well entwined. He was vice commodore in 1969, and in charge of the junior sailing program as it entered its fourth season. He became commodore in 1970, and loved sailing Gold Rush, the Pye's C&C 27. We are fortunate to be able to draw on the eulogy given by Ken Pye's daughter, Kathy Gerasimoff, at her father's funeral. Here are her fond memories of one of Ken's greatest passions.

" . . .And then, of course, there was sailing, Ken's greatest passion. We were ALL there from the get-go. I'll never forget when we ALL went over to the States when he needed to buy ALL of the fittings for the first boat he built, the Crescent! We three kids were in the back seat waiting for hours and hours for him to be done. That boat was the slowest and heaviest of all the boats around, but we'd still faithfully race every Sunday afternoon, vying for last place with Collin Griffiths in his boat with the red sail. When the racing became more serious with the Y Flyer, the Shark, the Viking, and the C & C 27, we still raced as a family. Suzie and Rick were there, too. My dad never did have a topnotch racing crew, but we had those special family times.

"We all remember the overnight cruises to Boblo and to Metropolitan Beach. We'd want to get there, and there'd be no wind, but Ken would very seldom turn on the motor and would say, "Look at the ripples up ahead." Gosh, he was persistent! And then there was the famous "It's clearing on the horizon!" My mom would go out in the boat with him in all sorts of cruises and races, even when

she was scared of the spinnaker or the bad weather. "My dad even built the little Cadet and a hydroplane for us "kids" to enjoy! We all knew that he shouldn't have been putting in the boat this year, when he had a hard time even walking and getting around, but we wanted him to have just one last summer. We made him promise that he wouldn't go out alone, and that once we got off from school, we'd have lots of time to go out with him.

"I think it would have broken his heart to put the "For Sale" sign on, so he never had to do that. Although he never got out for a last sail, he was out at the boat putting around on the day before he died. He even had some putty in some plastic wrap on the television to go put around one of the windows on Thursday, so he would have been there again. Ken's "sailing family" has always been an important part of his life. He so-much enjoyed the Saturday night cards and the Retirees' lunches.

"We've all always looked up to my dad and admired him: his persistence and hard work (in fact, we often say he burnt himself out when he was young), his quiet, caring ways (he kept a lot inside), his profound sense of what is right and what is wrong, and his love and devotion to family and friends. He was a loving husband, an "I'm always there for you" dad, an involved grandpa, a caring son, brother, brother-in-law, uncle, and friend. If he could wake up and say something right now, I'll bet it would be, "Wanna' go for a sail? Look! It's clearing on the horizon." Let's remember all of the good pictures that make a life. We love you, Dad!"

Why my boat is best, or The Travels of Skylark

Skylark, a Mirage 35, came to SPSC in 1985, when Commodore Dick and Admiral Buddy Walker purchased her from Duncan Hind at the Ship's Wheel.

When the Walkers moved to Toronto in 1987, Skylark took in her dock lines and left South Port. In the company of Windsong she cruised through the North Channel and down Georgian Bay to her new home in Midland. There, she spent four summers cruising the Bay's 30,000 Islands and joining Ruffian, Firewater, and Windsong in favourite anchorages in the North Channel.



In 1992, Skylark was trucked to the St. Lawrence River, where she found a custom-made dock in front of Walkers' new home on Hill Island. She was sold in 1995, and her new owner kept her in Gananoque. Skylark spent the next four years cruising the Thousand Islands and Lake Ontario.

In 1999, we purchased her, and brought her back to South Port through the Trent-Severn waterway, Georgian Bay, and Lake Huron.

Skylark was equipped for long distance cruising in 2001. She headed down lake Erie to Buffalo, where she entered the Erie barge canal which took her to the Hudson River and on into the Atlantic. From there she took us down the intracoastal waterway to

Miami. In December, she crossed the Gulf stream and entered the turquoise waters of the Bahamas for a three-month stay. Retracing her course, she arrived back at SPSC to end her 9 ½ month journey in June of 2002.

Since then, she has been to the North Channel, and followed Windsong into the frigid waters of Lake Superior. Recently, she's been trading tacks with the JOG fleet on the Wednesday-night race course.

We find her to be a comfortable, easy to sail, and forgiving second home. We revel in the luxury of her hot and cold running water, shower, and deep sinks. Cooking is a breeze on her propane stove and oven, her bright spacious interior is excellent for entertaining, and her three-cylinder diesel engine sips fuel while providing plenty of power to get us out of any difficult situations.

We look forward to many more adventures aboard Skylark both in the North Channel and between the buoys on the Wednesday night race course.

It looks like we are off to a good season. Water levels are high for now, but we are expecting them to drop again at the end of the season. To avoid having to cut the season short, we will be dredging of the harbour starting on June 30.

Plans are to dredge A dock, the outer sections of B, C, D, and E docks, and to remove the ridge behind F-dock. If your well is to be dredged, you will be contacted by the harbourmaster regarding moving your boat. Boats will have to be relocated one section at a time due to the large number of wells to be dredged.

Thanks to Wayne Hind for fixing the red entrance light. It wasn't coming on due to a blown photocell. Thanks to Dave Robichaud for replacing the photocell on the range light. It was refusing to turn off during the day. Seems that this was a bad year for photocells!

Some of the larger projects being considered for next year include repairs to the gobi mats, sidewalk phase II 'E-Dock' and reorganization of the dinghy area.



Mainstays fun


