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


John Staley May 1933 - December 2020

John and Beverly Staley (2017) joined South Port in 1989, and sailed his C&C 27 'Sweet Belle' until 2011 when he brought 'Feathers', an Irwin 37 to our harbour. He was an active member of the club, serving as Commodore in 2001. The family spent many summers cruising the North Channel.

John retired after 40 years of teaching as principal of St. Anne High School in 2009, the same year he received The Community Outreach Award from The Tecumseh Knights of Columbus for his exemplary contributions to various causes and goodwill endeavours throughout the Windsor and Tecumseh area. He was President of The Friends of Pike Creek taking action on the environmental front, always setting an example as a mentor for youth. John was President of the Ontario Council of the St. Vincent de Paul Society and was devoted to their work, visiting inmates in jail, and assisted in a fundraising effort to provide items to the needy in the downtown area. He served as a lector and minister at St. Anne Church.

John and Bev had 11 children, 39 grandchildren and more than 20 great-grandchildren. South Port members send condolences to his family and many friends.





With all the COVID restrictions at the present time, I am being very optimistic and have tentatively scheduled the LAUNCH for April 24th. More details will follow, when we can start working on the boats and club opening.

The Summer Dockage and Release form will be sent out the end of the month. This year there is a slight change, and you will be required to attach a copy of your boat insurance with the application, to confirm your coverage is up to date.

There are several new projects which are being considered for this year In addition to the one that was not completed last season. The new projects are upgrading the electrical system for the hoist, building storage racks for masts since the new plastic picnic tables are not useable, painting the cart for moving the boats and repairing the leaking hydraulics, plus several small maintenance tasks.

Volunteers are needed for painting the cart. Please let me know if anyone is interested in clocking early work hours.

At the present time until we receive this years requests for dockage, dry storage and dinghy storage, there are no openings.

Cruising - Ken Blyth



Cruising in the new year may be a challenge in a, hopefully, post pandemic world. It is too early to know what restrictions may affect us this coming sailing season. My hope is that we'll be able to resume to, at the very least, what we experienced during the last summer. even with restrictions still in place by following the rules.

Our last season, though restricted, still allowed us to enjoy the North Channel for a month. This season I am hopeful that we can do more of the same. I am proposing a list of Canadian destinations for everyone's consideration.

This is a list of possible destinations with the type they are, dinner overnight or anchoring out for an afternoon, overnight, or longer.

- Pelee Island, a marina or possible anchor
- Leamington Marina, marina
- Cedar Island YC, marina
- Boblo Island, marina
- Crystal Bay, anchor (BBQ back of boats)
- Peche Island, anchor
- Sandbar, marina (dinner)
- Belle River, marina (BBQ or walk for dinner)
- Lighthouse Cove, marina or TRYC as guests (out for dinner, BBQ, or potluck)
- Sarnia, Sarnia Bay, XXX, or SYC. (approx 11 hr sail)
- Bayfield, Kincardine, Port Elgin. (stops along Lake Huron)
- Tobermory, Marina (close by anchorages- Club Island, Cabot Head/Wingfield Basin, Cove Island)
- North Channel, many spots to enjoy, (anchor or marinas)

I would also like to hold a few seminars on things to know for those that are new to cruising. Things that will help to make your decisions to untie the dock lines and "sail away" a little easier and more comfortable.

Some subjects we can cover are anchoring, provisions, equipment, choosing a destination, weather, and getting experience and confidence to head out on bigger waters and farther off destinations. If anyone has any questions feel free to email me or chat inn person, and remember several of our members have sailed farther afield and have experiences and knowledge that can be gleaned for information. Some of this, seminars and discussions, may have to be virtual until restriction are lifted. So, what would you like to talk about,

It is difficult to know at this time exactly when and how tasks will be completed this spring and summer. I expect property work parties will be limited as to the number of volunteers in order to follow social distancing. With Covid 19 still active in our area, we will be following the guidelines of The Windsor- Essex County Health Unit & Sail Canada.

Included in the property budget/to do list 2021 are the following items:

-additional gravel at the dry sail boat area on the south side of the lot
-inspecting the VHF radio in the kitchen (open for replacement)
-painting the sunroom walls & trim
-replacing some of the picnic tables
-dismantling and disposing of the tables no longer serviceable
-painting the tops & seat of the green tables
-painting back deck
-replacing the vacuum & small freezer
-trimming cedar hedge on the west side of the parking lot



-changes to the honey bucket drain in the parking lot, allowing cars to drive over the area The unit will be stored at the range light rock garden giving easier access to the dry sail boats -a solution to deter the carpenter bees at the front entrance door (Pest Control)

Bill & Lynn Baker have volunteered to take over raising the flags each year after launch and lowering after haul out. A big thank you to Jack Entwistle who has been carrying this out for approximately 10 years. The flag pole also needs some repairs.

Work hour slips will remain in the foyer and we ask you to fill them out immediately after completing a task. Tim Aseltine is taking over recording members club hours. This will make his job much easier in keeping the posted monthly summary sheets up to date and accurate.

The clubhouse duty binder will remain in the lobby until such time the main room and kitchen are reopened. Club duties remain cancelled until the current lockdown is lifted. I will continue sending emails when work hours are available.
