We have started work on F dock. Upgrades will be continuing throughout the season..


#### Work hours reminder

#### Man Overboard, by Bill Steel





I knew that this was no ordinary Man Over Board drill the moment I hit the water. I watched my unmanned boat head away under power and with sails up in the middle of Lake St. Clair. The first emotion was panic, then thoughts of losing loved ones, and then anger for being so stupid. I was not wearing my PFD.

It all started on a beautiful fall Saturday, sailing solo to Great Lakes Yacht Club. The sun was out, the wind on the nose, but 'hey', I was still sailing a week away from haul out. I was at least a half a mile east of Grosse Pointe Yacht Club when my tiller extender slipped overboard. It was bobbing vertically and I circled back to pick it up. I started the engine at slow speed, but didn't change the sail set.

As I approached, I held onto the lifeline and reached down in time to grab the extender. Just one more inch and I've got it...that's when my fulcrum shifted and the full weight of my body was leaving the boat, my grip was backwards without enough strength to hold me back.

All I could think of was, this was it for me and that it was my own fault. There I was treading water with the \$80 extender in my hand, without much hope of swimming to safety. As I looked around for other boats, I spotted my trusty Rubaiyat circling back towards me...I couldn't believe my luck. Fortunately, I picked the right side of the boat to stay on and didn't get run over and cut up by the prop. The other piece of luck was actually sloppy line coiling where a loop from my safety throw ring was hanging lower than the rest and within reach.

With a final lunge, I was able to grab the line and now, at least, be towed behind the boat. Getting back on board wasn't so easy. Using the toe rail as my next grip, I was able to get one foot on top of the rudder ( which, of course, was swinging freely). Even then, I was way too low and heavy to haul my self up. With strength ebbing, but adrenaline flowing, I made a desperate reach for the top of the stern rail, then got one foot over the toe rail, and then inch by inch, over and into the cockpit. I was bruised and shaking, but back on the boat. I said a prayer of thanks for getting another chance.

The reason I'm writing this is not to share a wild adventure. There are several important lessons that I have painfully learned and want to share with others so that there are no accidents or drownings:

- Despite the many reasons why "I" didn't need to wear a PFD ("I'm only in the cockpit", "I'm a seasoned veteran", "what could go wrong on a nice day?"), YOU MUST ALWAYS WEAR A PFD WHEN SAILING SOLO. STUFF HAPPENS!
- 2. In the unlikely event that you are overboard, YOU NEED TO HAVE A LINE OR ACCESSIBLE LADDER WITHIN REACH FROM THE WATER, in order to get back into the boat.

Please do not reassure yourself that this could never happen to you and take chances...your life could depend on doing the safe thing. I wouldn't count on your boat circling back for you.

#### WORK HOUR POLICY

(Summarized March 2018)

- 1. Work hours will be accumulated between January and December.
- Work hours are to be recorded using the slips provided in the foyer, with the exception of Clubhouse Duties that are recorded in the kitchen binder. Members are to fill out the nature of the work performed and check off the committee it is concerning.
- All work hours must be recorded and submitted in the work hour box within 30 days of performing the task or risk forfeiting the hours worked.
- 4. No third party can work on behalf of a member and receive credit.
- Hours can be worked in the areas of Harbour, Property, Sailing School, Racing and Cruising as well as clubhouse repairs and cleaning.
- Members shall consult with the various committee chairs for a list of eligible activities entitled for work hours outside of any sanctioned work parties scheduled for the year.
- Members are responsible to check the schedule posted on the bulletin board or the website calendar for any clubhouse duties that may be assigned.
- Cradle moving, Launch and Haul-out are not eligible for work hours for those launching a boat unless approved by the Harbourmaster. Any member that dry-sails or doesn't not have a boat is encouraged to participate.
- Where the membership category permits, any work performed in cooperation with your spouse will count twice (Clubhouse duties 2 people total 2 hrs x 2 = 4).
- 10. The executive reserves the right to audit any hours submitted.

#### 2020 Series Calendar

Racing to be every Thursday evening, from July 2<sup>nd</sup>, to Sept 24<sup>th</sup>.

Due to the late start this year, there will be only one Series to decide the 2020 Club "Series Championship".

#### Start Times

The first warning signal will be at 1845.

#### 1 Rules

The series will be governed by the rules as defined in *The Racing Rules of Sailing*.

As necessary, the series will also be governed by the Windsor-Essex County Health Unit's pandemic rules.

The Harold Asselstine Memorial Trophy document details how overall placing in a spinnaker division applies to the awarding of the trophy.

#### Sailing Instructions

The Sailing Instructions and any additional documents are available either in the clubhouse or downloadable from the web site. Any changes to the Notice of Race will be incorporated into the online version and posted as a notice to competitors.

#### The Official Notice Board

The official notice board is on the window of the clubhouse's enclosed porch. Notices will be mirrored on the web site within 48 hours of being posted

#### 2 Racing Classes

#### 2.1 Shark One-Design

Canadian Shark Class Association rules are in effect.

#### 2.2 PHRF Handicapped

Essex County PHRF Association rules are in effect except that there are no minimum crew limits.

Time-on-Time Corrected times will be calculated using time-on-time handicapping.

JOG There will be a single JOG class.

SPINNAKER. There will be a single "Spinnaker" class. (Note that at time of writing Ontario Sailing is not allowing spinnakers when racing.)

#### 2.3 Class Flag colours

JOG	White
Shark	a Shark
Spinnaker	Green

#### 2.4 Certificates

A current valid measurement or rating certificate is not required. This changes rule RRS 78.1. Getting and maintaining a proper rating certificate is encouraged.

#### 2.5 Registration

Please complete the online registration form as early as possible. A \$20 annual entry fee must be delivered to the Race Office before racing. Non-member boat fee \$30 for the year.

#### 3 Racing Area

The racing area shall start at Mark S, 0.5 nautical miles at 030 · magnetic from outside the Pike Creek channel on Lake St. Clair. Marks are arrayed differently this year, in 2 triangles, for simplicity.

Marks are numbered white can buoys.

#### 4 Courses

Courses will be described in the Sailing Instructions and on the SPSC website Racing page.

#### 5 Participation Requirements

To be eligible for this award a boat must be entered by a South Port Sailing Club member.

#### 6 Scoring

Per RRS A9

#### 7 Prizes

For the 2020 Thursday-Night Series, prizes will be awarded in each class, with the number of awards depending on class size. 1 to 3 boats = 1st place award

To 5 boats = 1st place award

Up to 5 boats = 1st and 2nd place awards

Over 6 boats = 1st, 2nd and 3rd place awards

Awards this year, may not be Flags, due to budget restrictions.

SPSC perpetual trophies will be awarded in each class. The series will count towards the awarding of the Harold Asselstine Memorial Trophy for outstanding performance in a spinnaker class. All prizes will be presented at the Awards Banquet.

#### 2020 Thursday Night Race - Sailing Instructions



Rules: The racing will be governed by the Racing Rules of Sailing 2017-2020, and all Covid-19 based rules/laws of Ontario Sailing and the Windsor-Essex County Health Unit applicable on the day of each race.

Changes to Sailing Instructions: Any changes to the Sailing Instructions will be posted on the SPSC Bulletin Board (temporarily – a Sunroom porch window) before 17:45 on the day that it will take effect.

Racing Dates: Racing to be every Thursday evening, from July 2nd, to Sept 24th. Due to the late start this year, there will be only one Series to decide the 2020 Club "Series Championship".

Radio Communications: The RC will attempt to monitor VHF channel 68.

#### Starting and Class Flags:

#### (See over for info on Starting system using lights)

- RC Boat positioning: to the starboard end of the Starting Line, at approximately 90 degrees to the first course. Opposite end of line at S Mark.
- Start Times: First warning signal approx 18:45. First start approx. 19:00.
- Subsequent starts to be approx 5 minutes apart
- Class Flags: Jog class = White / Shark class = Shark flag / Spinnaker class = Green

#### Permanent Marks:

The racing area shall be centered at Mark S, 0.5Nm at 030° magnetic from outside the Pike Creek channel on Lake St. Clair. Marks are arrayed differently this year, in two 2.0Nm triangles, for simplicity. Marks are numbered white can buoys.

# Course 1 Outer Marks to Starboard Start (Mark S) - Odeg for 2.0mi Round Mark 1 (to stbd) – 120deg for 2.0mi Round Mark 3 (to stbd) – 240deg for 2.0mi Round Mark S (to port) – 225deg for 0.25mi Cross the line between RC and F mark

# Course 3 Outer Marks to Port Start (Mark S) - 60deg for 2.0mi Round Mark 3 (to port) - 300deg for 2.0mi Round Mark 1 (to port) - 180deg for 2.0mi Round Mark S (to stbd) - 225deg for 0.25mi Cross the line between RC and F mark

#### Course 2 Outer Marks to Starboard

Start (Mark S) – 30deg for 2.0mi Round Mark 2(to stbd) - 150deg for 2.0mi Round Mark 4(to stbd) - 270deg for 2.0mi Round Mark S (to port) - 225deg for 0.25mi Cross the line between RC and F mark

Course 4 Outer Marks to Port
Start (Mark S) - 90deg for 2.0mi
Round Mark 4 (to port) - 330deg for 2.0mi
Round Mark 2 (to port) - 210deg for 2.0mi
Round Mark S (to stbd) - 225deg for 0.25mi
Cross the line between RC and F mark

Time Limits: Boats finishing 30 minutes or more after the lead boat in their fleet will be scored DNF.

Warnings / Prohibitions: Boats whose warning signal has not been made shall avoid the starting area during the starting sequence for other classes and shall avoid interfering with the boats preparing to start. Boats shall stay clear of the start/finish line while racing, and shall not pass through that line except when finishing. Boats may be protested for violating this instruction.

Protests: Normally as per RRS Sec A. Note that at time of writing, Ontario Sailing has spec'd that there will be NO protests. This does not dismiss racers from their responsibility of racing safely and fairly.

#### 2020 Thursday Night Race - Sailing Instructions




This year we are experimenting with a new semi-automated light system that is intended to greatly simplify the work on the Race Committee boat.

We will continue to use the flags on the RC boat during the starting sequences, but the automated system will sound the horns, and signal the RC as to when the flags go up and down.

The automated system will also light two stacked lights on a pole mounted on the RC Boat, as shown below.

Our typical 2020 sequence for each class start will look like this:



There are clubs that use only the lights for starting races, having done away with starting flags.

Note that even with a fully automated starting system, flags will still be used to signal which class is starting, and to signal events such as postponements and recalls (individual and/or general).
